

Concepts of conversion/call

Psychological – Guilt? Shame? – Romans 7:19

Spiritual – Caught up into third heaven (2 Corinthians 12)

Mystical – Merkabah vision/contemplation

Conversion – from one community to another

Mission to Gentiles and "Council" of Jerusalem

Paul's sense of mission

Christ for all people – neither Jew nor Greek, slave nor free, male nor female, you are all one in Christ Jesus (Galatians 3:28)

Argument with Apostles in Jerusalem

James and Peter

"We should not make it difficult for the Gentiles who are turning to God." (Acts 15:19)

Peter's "backsliding" - Galatians 2:11-13

Acts of the Apostles

Jesus Movement is called The Way – Luke's name for the followers of Jesus

Jesus and all his original close followers were Jews

Should The Way be merely a new "denomination" within Judaism?

Pharisees

Sadducees

Essenes

Zealots/Sicarii

Am Ha'aretz

The Way

Open only to Jews, and thus be a new "denomination"?

Semi-Jews?

God-fearers

Proselytes

Or should The Way be open to all, without Gentiles needing to become Jews first? Peter vs. Paul
