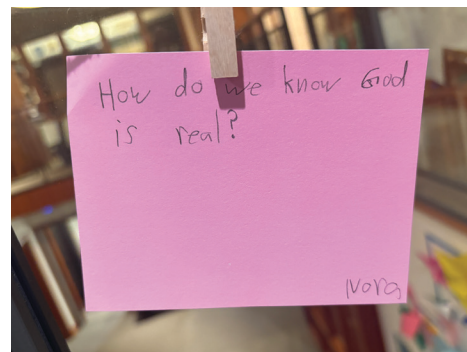
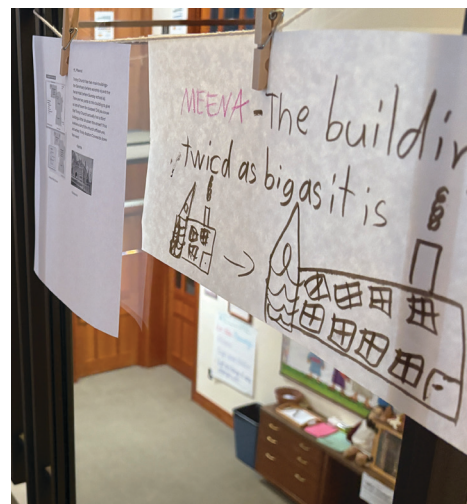


During the Program Year, on the balcony on the third floor of the Parish House, you will find a clothesline with dozens of notecards across it. Each one has children's messy handwriting scrawled across in pencil, and most of them have a typed-out piece of paper next to them.

This past Program Year, Trinity Children's Ministry has started a "Q&A Wall" for the youngest members of the church community. No question is off limits, and every single question is treated with love and respect. This began as a small project in Children's Homily but quickly became a fan favorite. In the few months since it was put up, the blank cards have had to be replaced three times. The children simply write a question on a card and pin it to the clothesline. Kenna Easter, Trinity's Minister for Early Childhood, takes each card and writes down the question. As much as possible, she tries to match the question with a staff member who might be best suited to answer, as well as answering many herself. With luck and a little effort, the question is answered in only a couple of weeks!

"How does the organ work?" asks one card, answered by Jerrick Cavagnaro, the Associate Director of Music, where he talks about the 7,000 pipes in the sanctuary and how organists control the air that blows through them.

"Is Jesus related to Santa?" asks another card. "No, they are not in the same family," writes Rev. Kit Lonergan, "but I do think

that both Santa and Jesus believe in encouraging all of us to try again even if we aren't our best selves some days."

Many of the questions are about the history of Trinity Church, especially as we approach the 150th anniversary of the building. Questions about renovations, how Trinity chose its name, and "why are there so many businessmen [in Copley Square]" are often answered by the Manager of Archives and IT, Sandy Marxen, who finds the answers from Trinity's records.

Some of the questions are even more complicated. Why is life hard? Why did God pick Jesus instead of anyone else? Why is church important? Not all of them have perfect answers. The most important part of the Q&A Wall is showing that these questions matter, and that each and every child that walks through Trinity's doors is loved and cared about by God and by their community.

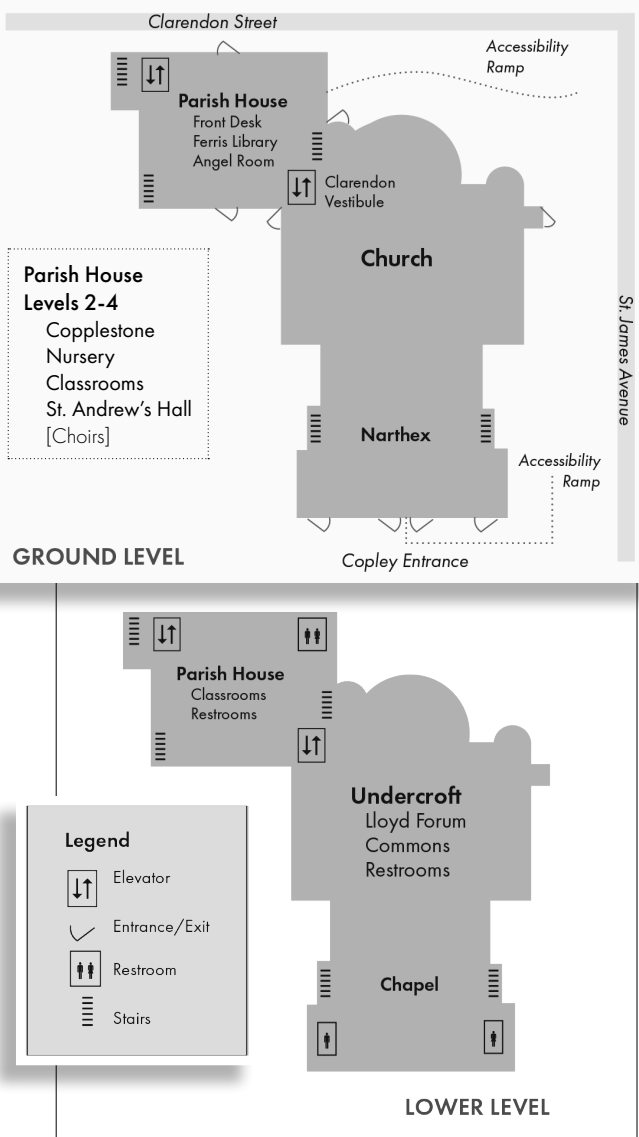

RENEWAL OF BAPTISMAL VOWS

Through the Paschal mystery, dear friends, we are buried with Christ by Baptism into his death and raised to newness of life. 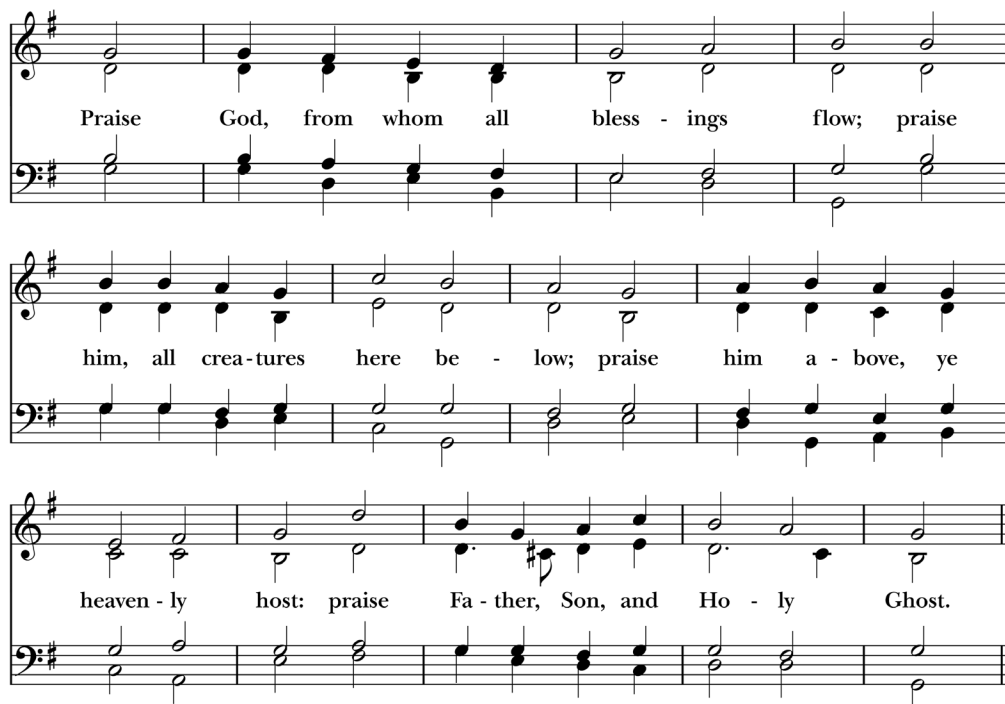

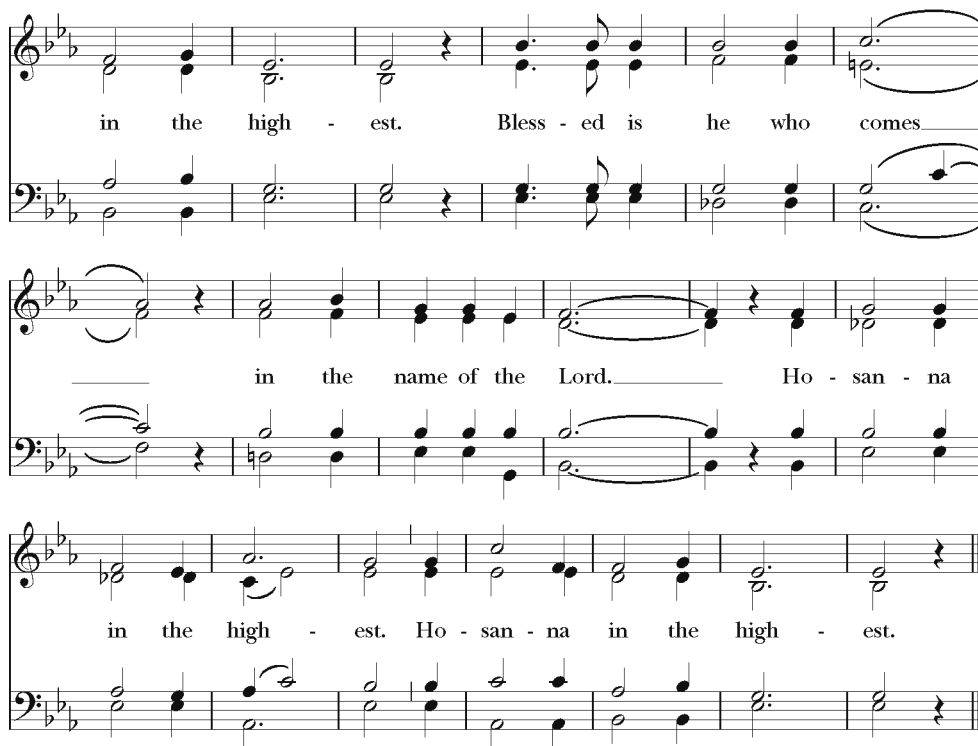

Holy and gracious God: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus, your only and eternal Christ, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Creator of all. The Gifts of God for the People of God.

Trinity Church and The Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts welcome all to Holy Communion. If instead of the sacrament in either kind you prefer to receive a blessing in the name of God, cross your arms over your chest. With that cue, a priest will offer a short prayer.

To receive the sacrament, come to the altar rail; stand or kneel (as you are able or as your piety prefers); and extend your hands, one inside the other. In turn, the priest will place a consecrated wafer in your open palm. If you require a gluten-free wafer, please request one from the priest offering Communion.

A Eucharistic Minister will follow with the wine; to receive, help guide the chalice to your lips. The server wipes the chalice's rim after every sip.

For those who find it easier to remain in their pew, please signal an Usher, and a priest will bring the sacrament to you.

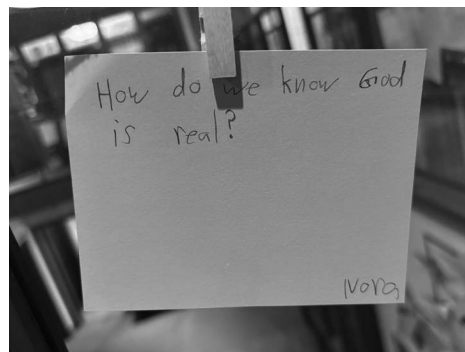
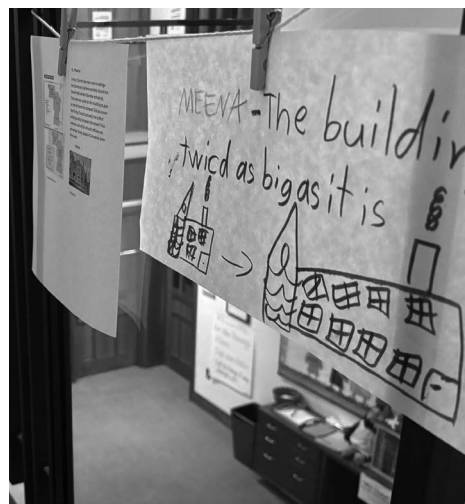
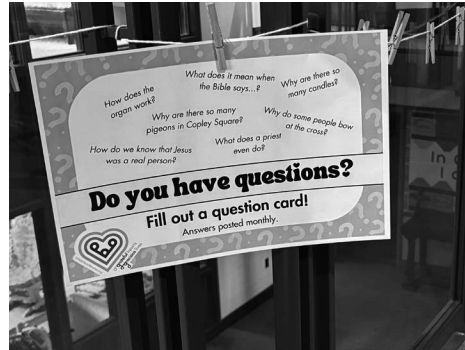
